Herricks' 10th Anniversary of the Lunar New Year Festival

On February 12th, 2011, the Herricks High School gym was filled with more than 1000 people, all gathered to watch the annual Lunar New Year Festival hosted by Herricks High School's Asian American Cultural Club. The event was sponsored by the Chinese American Association of North Hempstead (CAANH) with a grant by the former New York State Senator Craig Johnson. The celebration exposed the Chinese Lunar New Year culture through performances, arts and crafts, and Chinese Yo-Yo lessons.

The celebration began in the afternoon with a Chinese Chess Tournament and a Ping-Pong Tournament. In the evening, the show started out with the lion dance, accompanied by the sonorous drum, cymbals and gong. The audience was then welcomed by Ms. Trisha Ho—advisor of the Asian American Cultural Club, Mrs. Lana Choy—the Co-President of CAANH, and New York State Senator Jack Martins. Following this, Principal Dr. Jane Modoono and Assistant Principals Mr. Andrew Frisone and Mr. Bryan Hodge came out in traditional Chinese clothing to perform the *Bai Nian*, a Chinese New Year greeting. The administrators tossed out candy to an audience that was on its feet with their arms stretched out.

The night was filled with singing of all age groups. Elementary school students from the Saturday Recreation Sing-Along Class sang *He Xin Nian* and *Hong Cai Mei Mei* with adorable little dance moves. Then, Herricks' two 9th grade Chinese classes came out to sing *Tomorrow Will Be Better*, a song inspired by the single *We are the World* written by Michael Jackson and Lionel Richie. Afterward, Herricks High School's Men's Choir sang the popular song *Tong Hua*, a love song written by Guang Liang.

In addition to singing, Herricks' students also had performances of the Chinese Yo-Yo and the Chinese Drum Dance. The Chinese Yo-Yo team captured the audience with its high level tricks that the team makes it look easy to do. The Chinese Drum Dance had a combination of grace and sophistication. The ten girls walked with elegance

and captivated their audience with the beats of their drums. Moreover, five college students showed their spectacular moves on their Wushu performance which was another highlight of the evening.

Professional performances included a magic show, and a performance by Happy Chef. Happy Chef, a performer from last year's show, came back with new and seemingly impossible acts! Not only was he able to balance a wine bottle on the handle of a spatula held up by his mouth, but also able to flip the wine bottle so that the neck of the wine bottle fell on the handle of a spatula, without using his hands! This crowd favorite performance was impressive.

To celebrate the 10th year anniversary, two large cakes were presented and distributed at the end of the show. Throughout these past ten years, the show grew and grew. The first festival was held in Searingtown Elementary School and Center Street Elementary School, respectively. The second festival was held in the Shelter Rock Public Library. As the event grew bigger and bigger, it moved to the Herricks High School Gymnasium. Back in 2002, the Lantern Dance and the Chinese Yo-Yo performance were the only two groups with Herricks performers, and the rest were all hired performances. This year, six of the performances were performed by Herricks students and only two groups were hired. The Chinese Yo-Yo team, who for the last two years had members from Great Neck South HS, now consists of only Herricks High School students.

As the show grows, so does the audience. The NYS Senator, Herricks administrators and faculty staff are now regulars in this community event. Its free admission and varying performances attract the community to come back every year. Even after ten years, the Asian American Cultural Club and the Herricks' Chinese New Year Parents Committee continue to surprise the community with their commitment and dedication in spreading the Chinese culture.

In Fall 2010, the CAANH kicked off the school year with its continual sponsorship of the Chinese language program facilitated by SEPTA (Gifted and Talented program) at the Manhasset Library—one for beginners, and one for advanced students. In the Spring of 2011, the CAANH also worked tirelessly in conjunction with the SCA to fund the first extended Chinese language session for second graders at Munsey Park and Shelter Rock elementary schools.
